Virginia Department of Education 1 Dyslexia Awareness Month Information

Governor Terry McAuliffe has recognized October 2015 as Dyslexia Awareness Month for the Commonwealth of Virginia. October has traditionally been declared Disability Awareness Month and continues as such. In 2004, the International Dyslexia Association's Board of Directors voted to promote this month as Dyslexia Awareness Month as well, and from that time forward, activities have been focused during this month by organizations associated with research, instruction, and support of individuals with dyslexia to raise awareness of the strengths and challenges of those with dyslexia.

A definition of dyslexia is contained the Administrative Code of Virginia within the *Regulations Governing Special Education Programs for Children with Disabilities in Virginia*, <u>8VAC20-81-10</u>. <u>Definitions</u>. "Specific learning disability means a disorder in one or more of the basic psychological processes involved in understanding or in using language, spoken or written, that may manifest itself in the imperfect ability to listen, think, speak, read, write, spell or to do mathematical calculations, including conditions such as perceptual disabilities, brain injury, minimal brain dysfunction, dyslexia, and developmental aphasia."

"Dyslexia is distinguished from other learning disabilities due to its weakness occurring at the phonological level. Dyslexia is a specific learning disability that is neurobiological in origin. It is characterized by difficulties with accurate and/or fluent word recognition and by poor spelling and decoding abilities. These difficulties typically result from a deficit in the phonological component of language that is often unexpected in relation to other cognitive abilities and the provision of effective classroom instruction. Secondary consequences may include problems in reading comprehension and reduced reading experience that can impede growth of vocabulary and background knowledge." From the "where as" statements within the Governor's proclamation, we understand that dyslexia is a language-based learning disability with the severity of impact varying from individual to individual. The proclamation further acknowledges that the challenges of this condition should be addressed with effective instructional approaches and practices. By proclaiming October as a month to raise awareness around dyslexia, an opportunity to discuss appropriate instruction to address the needs of students is provided, but also an opportunity to celebrate the accomplishments of those individuals with dyslexia.

Below are suggested activities to highlight this month of dyslexia awareness with in schools.

School Faculty Meetings

- As the proclamation indicates, some individuals with dyslexia are quite famous and/or have achieved prominent statue within their professions. A discussion and presentation regarding these individuals would allow a view of the positive accomplishment among those that in education are perceived to have challenges.
